# **Easter Recipes**

### **Easter Brownie Bites**

Prep: 15 mins Cook: 15 mins

Easy: Makes 24 mini brownies

# **Ingredients**

- 175g butter, chopped
- I 50g dark chocolate
- 250g light brown soft sugar
- 85g self-raising flour
- 50g cocoa powder
- 3 large eggs, beaten
- I 00g milk chocolate chips
- 24 mini chocolate eggs, plus extra to decorate



- Step I Heat oven to 180C/160C fan/gas 4. Line 24 holes of a mini muffin tray with paper cases. Put the butter, dark chocolate and sugar in a pan and heat it very gently, stirring all the time until the butter and chocolate have melted. Remove from the heat and leave to cool for a few mins.
- Step 2 Meanwhile, sift the flour, cocoa and a good pinch of salt into a large bowl. Stir in the warm, melted chocolate mixture and the beaten eggs, then add half the chocolate chips and mix.
- Step 3 Divide the mixture between the cases and place a mini egg into the middle of each muffin, pushing down gently. Bake for 12-15 mins until cooked but still gooey in the centre they will continue cooking a little as they cool down. Leave to cool for 10 mins in the tin before transferring to a wire rack to cool completely.

### Easter Egg Cheesecake

### **Ingredients**

- Vegetable oil, for the tin
- 200g digestive biscuits
- 80g unsalted butter, melted
- 250g chocolate mini eggs or leftover Easter eggs
- 400g full-fat soft cheese
- 150g icing sugar
- I tsp vanilla bean paste
- 400g double cream

# Method

- Step I Oil a 20cm deep springform cake tin and line with baking parchment. Tip the digestive biscuits into a food bag or the bowl of a food processor and crush or blitz to a fine crumb. Mix with the melted butter, then press into the base of the prepared cake tin and chill for 30 mins.
- Step 2 Roughly chop half the chocolate mini eggs. Beat the soft cheese with the icing sugar and vanilla until just combined using an electric whisk. Clean the beaters, then beat the double cream to stiff peaks in a separate bowl. Gently fold the whipped cream into the soft cheese mixture along with the chopped chocolate mini eggs. Spoon the cheesecake mixture over the biscuit base, then smooth the surface with a palette knife or spatula. Chill overnight.
- Step 3 The next day, carefully release the cheesecake from the tin (you may need to run a cutlery knife around the edge to loosen it) and top with the remaining whole chocolate mini eggs to decorate.









Year 8 pupils have really enjoyed learning the Ukulele as part of The Orchestra Unit this term in Music. They have become masters at reading and playing chords with great skill and musicianship being displayed.

We look forward to seeing you progress on these fun instruments, learning lots of new songs and strumming along.






Year 11 and 12 students have been busy this term as part of their Creative Arts and Digital Music course.

Students have been composing their own pieces of film music, developing their DJ Performance skills and preparing for the final performance exam on their chosen instrument.







# History

It has been a busy term in the History Department. The presentation from Lesley, sharing her family's experience, helped our students understand the devastating impact the Holocaust had on so many communities, families and individuals. It brought to life the personal experiences, the pictures and the recordings of her loving and happy family, which further enriched pupils' understanding. Lesley related the impact of the Holocaust in a modern day context.




# 'Smart Belfast' at QUB


The Year 13 and 14 Psychology students attended the 'Personality in Urban Futures' event at Queen's University as part of the NI Science Festival Schools and Educators Programme. This event brought together personality and careers within an urban futures society, in reference to the £35 million project to make Belfast a smart city (https://smartbelfast.city/).

Our students participated in a workshop where they learnt about 'Smart Belfast', their own personality (by taking and scoring their own personality survey), and which urban futures careers are most suited to their personality type. Researchers and community leaders also discussed personality and life outcomes, human technology interaction and what 'Smart Belfast' means for the young people in the area.



The psychology students really enjoyed assessing their own personality and we would like to thank QUB for inviting us to this event, as well as providing our transport.

Year 14 Hospitality students have been baking Easter treats and we couldn't resist showing off their excellent skills!




# Lego League



# True Colours Art Exhibition at the Ulster Museum





# **Breda Breakfast**





# Market Research at the Ulster Museum


Year 13 Travel and Tourism students visited the Ulster Museum in March to carry out market research for their coursework. Students were able to explore the museum in the morning, before having a bite of lunch at 1pm. Once lunch was over, every student was given three questionnaires to ask members of the general public. All of the students enjoyed this experience as it gave them the opportunity to speak first-hand to members of the public about their experience of the Ulster Museum. A wide range of people were questioned, and the results were exactly what was needed for a successful start to Section 2 of their coursework.



On our return to school, questionnaire results were gathered using a tally chart. After this,

results were inserted into Microsoft Excel and charts were drawn up so analysis of each question could begin. Students are currently working on the analysis section of their coursework and these results are proving invaluable.




























Term Two in the Geography Department has seen our students have the opportunity to develop their knowledge, understanding and skills about the world around us through a
