


I have had many fantastic times working with the wonderful staff and students at Breda Academy, both in the run-up to amalgamation and in the four years since the new school

Lifelong Learners at Breda - Staff on the other side of the desk!

"It's great to work with colleagues who make learning fun!"

We've all heard of Staff Development Days or training sessions, but most people probably don't know what goes on during them! During our last Staff Development session it was back to the classroom for your teachers and teaching assistants. Each staff member went to 3 different lessons (as pupils) whilst their colleagues demonstrated a range of active learning activities which they use in their lessons. We used Bunsen burners, cooked, completed activities about Mary Queen of Scots and Elizabeth I, studied poetry, took IQ tests from 1918 and developed our foreign language skills.

This was a really useful learning opportunity for our staff and we all learnt something new to bring back to our own classrooms or our own lives.

"Prior to going to see my work colleague's (Geography) lesson on the topic of recycling, I must admit I was giving him a hard time as I wanted to learn about volcanoes! After the lesson though, I am now an expert in recycling! We are very proud of Joshua and want to wish him good luck with his upcoming GCSE examinations. We will definitely look his business up on Facebook when we need gardening advice in the future!


Breda Academy pupils meet



WORK EXPERIENCE

Year II joined the world of work for one week in June. Our students went to a variety of work placements, including: gyms, schools, beauticians, bakeries, photographers, art studios and many more. The employers were all so impressed by their maturity and enthusiasm throughout the week. Yet again, we are extremely proud of Breda students who represent









Our talented Art students have yet again produced some very impressive pieces of Art work, which showcase their skills in a range of different disciplines. Well done to all of our GCSE and GCE Art students and their fantastic Art teachers. The Art Department has been busy this term with a variety of enrichment opportunities for their students. Art students from Years 10, 11 and 12 visited the Textile Art, Design & Fashion Department at



the Belfast School of Art, Ulster University for three days. They were involved in a collaborative project with the University and produced some beautiful work.



Textile Artist Irene MacWilliam visits the Art & Design Department.

Local contemporary textile artist, Irene MacWilliam, delivered an amazing workshop to GCSE & A Level pupils. A renowned quilter, a member of both the Northern Ireland Patchwork and Embroidery Guilds and an exhibitor both locally and internationally, she uses the medium of fabric and stitch to relate powerful imagery depicting political issues such as, starvation, the environment, climate change and conflict.

The main focus of this workshop, was to experiment with pattern as a formal visual element. In preparation for Irene's visit, pupils pre-made textured backgrounds, using a range of wall paper and tissue paper, before adding colour with brusho dyes and acrylic paint.

Using a range of recycled objects to produce her own stamps, Irene then creates her own patterned fabrics.

She kindly brought her huge collection into the classroom, where the pupils experimented with a range of different stamps to produce patterns based on their own individual theme of work. Pupils used sponges to apply either fabric paint or acrylic paint to their stamps, before printing. It was a very busy day, which was thoroughly enjoyed by all. During a follow up lesson, pupils put their portfolio page together, showcasing their own work, examples of Irene's work and with a short write up included.

Irene has recently been awarded a British Empire Medal, for her contribution to Textile Art.

Art & Design pupils visit the Island Arts Centre, Lisburn.

GCSE & A Level pupils attended a workshop by professional artist, Daniela Balmaverde. Daniela is a visual freelance artist from Italy, who now lives in Northern Ireland. She specialises in portraits, paintings and sculptures.

During the workshop, pupils were taught simple measuring techniques and body proportions. They produced a range of portrait drawings, using a range of media, including, charcoal, oil pastels, collage and acrylic paint. This was a most enjoyable day out!
