

Year 13 BTEC Level 3 Business students

attended an event at Queen's University Belfast, highlighting the growth of Social Enterprise in NI.

Most organisations aim to make a profit - but more businesses are now moving towards helping the community with that profit. This may mean using their profits to help the homeless, to help those who have just come out of prison, to help those who are trying to settle into a new country or to help those who are experiencing mental health issues, etc.

At the event, students listened to Martin Kelly, Business Lecturer at QUB, explain how this sector of NI has grown over the past few years and is set to rapidly expand further in the future. Indeed, many young people today may find themselves working for a social enterprise or setting up a social enterprise of their own!

Students listened attentively as several business people presented their own social enterprise products/service, explaining what inspired them to set it up, how they financed it, how they overcame problems they experienced, how they marketed their product/ service and most important of all ... the impact their business has had on the community - who they have been able to help as a result of starting their own business. Students also got an opportunity to engage in a question and answer session to glean more information on the subject.

During the final session, students had the opportunity to work in groups to come up with an idea for their own Social Enterprise. This was a lot of fun as students brainstormed various ideas then formulated a plan for carrying it out. They then had to present their ideas to others.

All in all it was a very informative, enjoyable and profitable day!

The two OCN Business Studies classes enjoyed a visit to Tesco's Customer Service Training Unit where they engaged in a number of interesting activities to learn how important customer service is to the success of a business.

After a fun ice breaker activity, Sarah McCullough, Senior Manager and her colleague spoke to the class about customer service and how Tesco go out of their way to look after their customers. This was followed by a quiz with anyone answering a question correctly getting a prize.

The students were then sent off to different parts of the Newtownbreda store with a questionnaire. Their goal was to observe how well a Tesco employee was serving a customer – were they wearing their uniform neatly? Did they smile and greet the customer in a friendly manner? Did they offer the customer any help? Back in the training room, the results of the questionnaires were discussed by the students and why it was important for staff to do these things.

Students also watched and discussed a Tesco staff training video and in groups played a card game in which they had to decide whether a certain type of customer service was emotional or functional. This caused a lot of debate in some groups as you can imagine!

Following a tasty lunch, students learnt about different types of shoppers and how to approach them. They did this by taking part in role play.
