Ingredients

60g dark chocolate 60g milk chocolate 2 eggs 120g butter 80g plain flour



170g caster sugar

Turn on oven to 180°C or Gas No. 5.

- Line and grease foil dish.
- Beat the eggs and sugar in a baking bowl with food mixer until a light
- Cut up chocolate into small pieces. Melt the chocolate and butter over a pan of boiling water.
- Add the melted chocolate and butter to beaten egg and sugar in the baking bowl and mix with the food mixer.
- Sieve the flour onto a dinner plate.
- Add the flour to the baking bowl and mix with wooden spoon. Ensure no small pockets of flour remain in the mix.
- Pour the mix into 2 lined foil dishes. Place on a baking tray and bake for 15-20 minutes.

Information for Parents / Guardians

The GCSE and GCE summer exam season starts in May and it's important that our learners are revising over the Easter Holidays.

The following advice should be followed at home to ensure your child is revising in the right way and in the right environment.

Assisting with revision

The secret to doing well in exams lies in planning. You can help your children to create a clear revision plan and method of studying that will make them feel in control of their work.

Tips for revision planning:

- work out a revision timetable for each subject. Use the subject's specification from the exam board to see what topics need to be covered for the exam.
- break revision time into small chunks e.g. hour long sessions with short breaks. Set a timer for this.
- make sure your child has all the essential books and materials.
- condense notes onto postcards to act as revision prompts you can buy cards cheaply in the Pound shops or cut up your own out of card.
- buy new stationery, highlighters and pens to make revision more interesting and make sure they have a suitable area in the house where they can revise somewhere quiet and where they can keep their revision materials organised.
- go through school notes with your child or listen while they revise a topic. Ask him / her to explain a topic to you.
- time your child's attempts at practice papers. Remember, if your child has extra time that equates to 25% extra time on top of the published time for that exam. Encourage him / her to use it.
- Your child should study in silence. Research has shown that we should study in the same context in which we are tested. Your child will be tested in silence, so therefore, he or she should study in silence. Put away those headphones and turn off the TV!
